Driving Rules at Samford University:

- Obey all traffic rules at all times.
- You must have a valid operator's license
- The speed limit on campus is 25 mph
- No passing other vehicles on campus.
- · Always stop for people walking across the road
- Parking decal must be showing on car.
- · No parking on grass or sidewalks
- You must park in your specified area
- All vehicle accidents on campus must be reported to Public Safety and Emergency Management.

Behavioral Expectations

There are behavior expectations of Samford students. The expectations are based on values that mostly come from the Christian faith.

Behaviors that do not meet these expectations:

Academic Integrity and Academic Dishonesty

Academic dishonesty is when a student lies or cheats on work for a class. A person who helps another person be dishonest is also guilty.

Examples:

- -copying another person's work
- -allowing your work to be copied by another person
- -turning in another person's work and claiming it is your work
- -plagiarism = the practice of taking someone else's work or ideas and passing them off as your own

If found guilty:

- -1st offense student receives a warning from ELLI instructor
- -2nd offense student will receive an ethics violation on their permanent record

Drugs and Alcohol Policy

- Drugs and alcohol are not allowed on campus.
- Drugs and alcohol are not allowed at any Samford University activity.
- The use of drugs or alcohol on campus will result in punishment or expulsion from Samford University.

Student Rights

If a student is given a value violation, the student goes through the following process.

Notice: To be informed in writing of the specific value violation and inappropriate behavior in which the student is suspected of involvement.

Procedures: To be informed orally or in writing of the process.

Hearing: To have an opportunity to be heard in person before a decision is made.

Evidence: To know what type of the evidence and to be able to question witnesses

Witnesses: To find and bring in witnesses to speak on the side of the student

Adviser: To have a Samford University faculty, staff, or student go to the hearing as a friend, adviser or counselor.

Written decision: To have a written response reporting the results of the hearing.

Appeal: To appeal a decision of the Values Advocate or Values Council, except when admitting committing a violation and a minimum sanction is given.

ELLI Attendance Policy and Classroom Expectations

Absences and Tardiness:

Each student is allowed 4 unexcused absences in each class per semester.

- If a student misses more than 4 classes unexcused, the student can receive a failing grade for that class (FA -failure due to absences).
- An absence may be excused if the instructor receives a doctor's or nurse's excuse for classes missed.
- Each student is responsible for making up any work missed in class and for any missed homework.
- Students who are late for class will be counted as tardy.
- Tardiness in 3 class periods will be counted as 1 absence from class.
- If a student arrives more than 15 minutes late for class, he or she will be counted as absent.

Each student is responsible for keeping account of his or her own absences and tardies. Any student with a question about absences or tardies should see the class instructor.

Disruptive Behavior:

If a student is disrupting the class, he or she <u>will be asked to leave</u> the classroom. Dismissal from the classroom will be counted as an unexcused absence.

The following behaviors are considered disruptive and will result in classroom dismissal:

- Talking or texting on a cell phone
- Continuous cell phone ringing
- Playing on a cell phone, computer, Ipad or other electronic device
- Excessive talking to other students
- Sleeping
- Distracting other students in any way
- Disrespecting the instructor (arguing, not participating, talking when the teacher is instructing)

Classroom Expectations:

- Be on time to your classes
- Please do not talk while your professors or other students are speaking. This is considered rude in American classrooms.
- Computers are allowed in many American classrooms, for taking notes or for teacher-directed internet research. Please do not use cell phones, Facebook, and other applications not directly related to your classes during class time. Teachers may ask you to leave the classroom for these behaviors, and you will receive an absence for this class.
- Computers, cell phones and other electronic devices are not allowed during testing.

Academic Probation

Any student who receives a 75 or below for a final semester grade will be placed on academic probation. The student will have one semester to bring up the grade. If the student receives another grade of 75 or below in the following semester, he or she will be dismissed from the program.

ELLI Bridge Progress Requirements

The following requirements are in place for advancing within the ELLI program.


- 1. A student may progress to the next ESL Bridge level for that class with a score of 75 or above.
- 2. ESL Bridge students may enter Samford **as full-time undergraduate students** when certain requirements are met:
 - -receive a score of Level 4 on all components of the WEBCAPE assessment (listening, reading, grammar)
 - -has a recommendation from Bridge program teachers
 - -completed all Level 4 classes
- 3. A student may possibly participate in a dual enrollment option. This means that a student will take 1-2 university classes while still taking needed ESL classes. This situation will occur when a student meets all of the following requirements:
 - -completes at least one semester of Bridge classes with an 80% or above in all Level 3 classes
 - -takes the WEBCAPE assessment for placement into ESL class (must continue taking the next recommended class for each skill, until a 4 is scored in that skill)
 - -has a recommendation from the Bridge program teachers
 - -receives advising from Samford advisor or department chair in designated major
 - -takes a basic skills test for the undergraduate classes desired
 - -enrolls in all Level 4 classes during dual enrollment

Checklist for Academic Success

✓ Keep a vocabulary card box or journal. Study and practice new vocabulary everyday.



- ✓ Review notes and do homework as soon as possible after class.

- Prepare for each class by studying the assigned readings, completing the homework assignments before class, and reviewing your notes.
- ✓ Find a study partner.





✓ Ask Questions



- ✓ Find native English speakers on campus to practice English with.

 This can really help you learn more quickly.
- ✓ Listen to the news (TV, internet, radio) in English several times per week because this also helps you learn more quickly.

PBS@ NEWS HOUR

- ✓ Try to figure out new vocabulary and pronunciation without a dictionary first. Sometimes you can understand more than you think, if you'll listen to or read the words in the text or lecture. If you still don't know, then you can use your dictionary.
 - ✓ Try to speak in only English when you are in your classes. Wait to translate or have something translated as a last step.

Plagiarism Contract

What is Plagiarism?

Plagiarism is taking the ideas or words of others and passing them off as your own. Plagiarism is a type of intellectual theft.

Common forms of plagiarism

- Downloading an assignment from an online source and submitting it as your own work.
- Buying, stealing or borrowing an assignment and submitting it as your own work.
- Copying a section of a book, article or website and submitting it as your own work.
- Copying, cutting and pasting text from an electronic source and submitting it as your own work.
- Taking exact sentences or paragraphs from someone else (essay, article, book, lecture, web page, newspaper) without quotation marks and without proper acknowledgement.
- Using the exact words of someone else, with proper acknowledgement, but without quotation marks.
- Putting someone else's ideas into your own words and not acknowledging the source of the ideas.
- Using your own ideas, but with heavy reliance on phrases and sentences from someone else without acknowledgement.
- Relying too much on other people's material; that is, repeated use of long quotations (even with quotation marks and with proper acknowledgement).
- Copying study aides such as Cliff's Notes, Sparknotes, and other sources.
- Buying papers from the Internet or using undocumented sources.

•	Copying the answers on another student's quiz or test and/or allowing another student to copy your work.
•	Telling or asking another person what is on a test prior to his or her taking it.
•	Postponing taking or completing a test in order to improve your grade.
